

Dear Habitat Community,

I write on the heels of an incredible 400 home initiative groundbreaking, with countless elected leaders, funders, neighborhood leaders and as many staff as we could spare in attendance. We also had one Habitat family join us as well. The plan is already well-covered within this newsletter so I will not belabor the topic, but I am just blown away by the support as well as the fervor for what Habitat for Humanity provides; the earned opportunity of homeownership within the families that we serve in the face of a growing need. Indeed, the book "Evicted" by Matthew Desmond was summoned at least twice within the speeches of elected leaders. This book rests on my bookshelf and does a brilliant but heartbreaking job of telling the stories of families living in poverty.

Another book rests on my shelf as well called "The Four Agreements" by Don Miguel Ruiz and lately that is the book captivating my mind and actions as we move forward. It is billed as a "practical guide to personal freedom" and speaks to how limiting certain beliefs can "rob us of joy". The four agreements in order are to:

- Be impeccable with your word
- Don't take anything personally
- Don't make assumptions
- Always do your best

Now, I try VERY hard to uphold all four, and feel like I am surrounded by staff and volunteers who do the same. I fail sometimes, and I can also say that it might be natural for newer leaders to have any of these four (especially taking things personally) get the best of them. I can remember my early days as a Summer Camp Director and feeling like every staff member mistake was a personal affront upon me and my leadership, which hindsight tells me is clearly not the case.

The agreement that I most have on my mind is #3, "Don't make assumptions" and the way that I translate it is that the greatest gift that we can give anyone is the benefit of the doubt. In a way, Habitat for Humanity makes it a mission and makes it its business to always give people, including and especially our prospective homeowners, the benefit

of the doubt. It can be so very easy to focus on a minority percentage of people who try to "game the system" from time to time. The truth is that we rob every one of our gifts and best selves if we lump everyone we work with into such a category up front. It is a terrible assumption to make in our profession. So too is the assumption when meeting a family with smart phones or flat screen televisions and making the leap that they are not worthy of our housing or other services. We all wish to better our lives and be our best selves - who does so without the ability to communicate or have entertainment in their lives?

The workplace is no different and once again better connection to our mission.

Habitat Launches Catalytic 400-Home **Initiative**



We do not use a word like "catalytic" lightly. It is a unique adjective to describe a unique moment in the 36-year history of Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity—Unprecedented government funding through the American Rescue Plan Act that will ensure funding for sustained growth. We anticipate receiving almost \$9 million over the next three to four years from the City of Cleveland and State of Ohio ARPA allocations. ARPA is the New Deal of our generation and a grant like this will allow us to expand our ability to meet one of Greater Cleveland's four key areas, one of which is new to us: most pressing needs — affordable homeownership opportunities for



historically underserved populations.

When we learned that these grants were available, we devised a "BHAG." short for "Big Hairy Audacious Goal," a phrase coined in the book Built to Last: Successful Habits of Visionary Companies. Our BHAG was to help 400 households in Greater Cleveland through

- Build 100 new homes across Greater Cleveland
- Rehabilitate at least 50 homes, which entails creating a genuinely new space with no major needs for at least ten years
- Hold "spruce up" events in the neighborhoods in which we work to assist existing homeowners with minor repairs, landscaping, clean-up and more, touching a minimum of 150 homes
- Create a new Critical Home Repair Program to do major repairs (roofs, porches, siding, etc) on at least 100 homes

another \$24 million from other funding sources, such as:

- HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds
- Cuyahoga Land Bank funds and land
- Generous foundation support
- Equity payments from our Partner Families
- Proceeds from our three ReStore locations
- Individual donors
- Proceeds from our annual Walk/Run/ Mosey fundraiser

This diverse set of funding streams, while complex, all come together to become something greater. And anyone can be a part of our BHAG through donations, volunteering or joining us for our annual Walk/Run/Mosey fundraiser.

We officially broke ground on our BHAG 400-Home Initiative on August 29th at an event attended by over 75 people. including Mayor Justin Bibb, Cleveland City Council President Blaine Griffin, Councilperson Jenny Spencer and many other dignitaries and partners.



The Amherst ReStore will have its first anniversary celebration in November to commemorate the Grand Opening of the ReStore as part of Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity and its expansion into Lorain County. There have been challenges, as there are with any new venture, but there is truly so much excitement and opportunity to continue our mission in Lorain County while providing residents a place to find discount furniture, home and building supplies as well as a donation center. Nancy, one of Amherst ReStore's dedicated volunteers has said, "The comment I hear most about the store is how well organized it is. Customers are often surprised to see the large selection

of merchandise we carry - paint, rugs, large and small appliances, tools, lawn and garden, kitchenware, dishes, decor, craft supplies, books, records, and DVDs, etc," adding "Shoppers like the bargain prices on new items." We couldn't continue our mission without volunteers like Nancy, the staff, the community partners, the shoppers and those who donate, and we look forward to what the new year has in store for us.

Out and About...

- This year, the ReStore got a new box truck with partial funding from the Ohio EPA. The new "green" truck is equipped with air conditioning and will have less of a negative environmental impact. Be on the lookout for the truck as it drives around town for donation pickups!
- One of the community events the ReStore participated in this year was a partnership with the At Home store in Elyria, in which the donation department brought the truck to the At Home parking lot to receive gently used household items in exchange for a coupon to be used in the At Home store.

This year we are excited to introduce Playhouse Project an opportunity for Greater Cleveland Habitat to partner with corporate sponsors to build playhouses for local families. Each playhouse kit is pre-made by a team of dedicated volunteer Playhouse Pros. The playhouses are then custom designed specific to the children who will be receiving them. To make the day even more special, at the end

of the build, the volunteers who design and build each playhouse are there for the big reveal when the families come to pick them up. These playhouses provide children with a safe place to play, increase their creativity and help them to imagine what owning a home is like. The funds raised through sponsoring a playhouse build go toward building big houses here in Cuyahoga and Lorain counties.
